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University Happenings:

November is the time of the annual AAR/SBL meeting somewhere in North America during the weekend before Thanksgiving. The Society of Biblical Literature group, to which I belong, focuses on Old and New Testament studies along with biblical backgrounds. The combined meeting annually attracts some 7,000 plus attendees. Added to these two flagship groups are numerous other smaller professional groups. The National Association of Baptist Professors of Religion (NABPR) is one of those which I participate in. Meetings take place from Friday through Tuesday and offer the opportunity to set in on literally hundreds of paper presentations and discussions. Sessions typically begin around 8:30 am and continue until around 10:30 pm each day. Most of the group sessions will have from 25 to 150 in attendance in order to encourage vigorous discussion and debate of the issues. Virtually every existing theological viewpoint found in N. America will be represented in the different discussions. The meeting this year, Nov. 17-22, at the Opryland Convention Center and Hotel in Nashville was no exception to the usual pattern.

Since I have been attending this meeting since the middle 1970s, I have gravitated toward seeking three benefits from the meeting: (1) attending selected seminar sessions that are related to current research interests; (2) checking out the book and software releases in the exhibit hall where virtually every publisher dealing with religious topics has a booth; (3) reconnecting to the dozens of former students and colleagues that I have established friendships with over these 25 plus years.

Claire and I enjoyed dinner engagements with several friends most every evening. As we walked around during the meetings I enjoyed speaking with friends from all around the country, and even a colleague from Germany. Many of these people I don't get to see except at this meeting each year. The ecumenical atmosphere of this meeting and the opportunity to get personally acquainted with scholars all across different Protestant, Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox traditions provide invaluable insights from a wide variety of perspectives. It is an effective barrier to the Baptist tendency toward isolationism.

The exhibit hall provided overwhelming temptation with an array of hundreds of new publications available at discounts up to 70%. I was able to add a few titles to my library, as well as computer software upgrades, notably Gramcord and Nota Bene.

Seminar sessions on NT Rhetorical Interpretation, Luke-Acts, James, Computer Assisted Research and a few others provided helpful new insights into current interpretative trends in these areas of special interest. These kinds of seminars are critical for one to stay aware of contemporary trends in biblical studies.

All in all the meeting was absolutely delightful, and productive. Claire is sharing some impressions of the hotel where we stayed.

The survey of NC Baptists will continue in next month's column. December is time for celebrating the immediate past. This year has brought many new experiences to Claire and me.

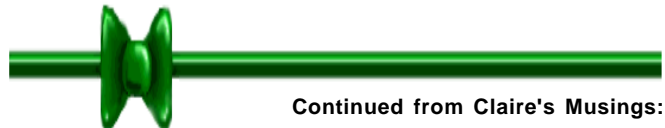
