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8.1.3. Voyage to Rome, Acts 27:1-28:13

8.1.3.1 First Leg of the trip, Acts 27:1-6, pt. 1, v. 1

Ὡς δὲ ἐκρίθη τοῦ ἀποπλεῖν ἡμᾶς εἰς τὴν Ἰταλίαν, παρεδίδουν τὸν τε Παῦλον καὶ τινὰς ἑτέρους δεσμώτας ἑκατοντάρχη ὀνόματι Ἰουλίῳ σπειρῆς Σεβαστῆς.

When it was decided that we were to sail for Italy, they transferred Paul and some other prisoners to a centurion of the Augustan Cohort, named Julius.



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8.1.3. Voyage to Rome, Acts 27:1-28:13

8.1.3.1 First Leg of the trip, Acts 27:1-6, pt. 2, vv. 2-3

2 ἐπιβάντες δὲ πλοίῳ Ἀδραμυττηνῶ μέλλοντι πλεῖν εἰς τοὺς κατὰ τὴν Ἀσίαν τόπους ἀνήχθημεν ὄντος σὺν ἡμῖν Ἀριστάρχου Μακεδόνα Θεσσαλονικέως. 3 τῇ τε ἑτέρᾳ κατήχθημεν εἰς Σιδῶνα, φιλάνθρωπος τε ὁ Ιούλιος τῷ Παύλῳ χρησάμενος ἐπέτρεψεν πρὸς τοὺς φίλους πορευθέντι ἐπιμελείας τυχεῖν.

2 Embarking on a ship of Adramyttium that was about to set sail to the ports along the coast of Asia, we put to sea, accompanied by Aristarchus, a Macedonian from Thessalonica. 3 The next day we put in at Sidon; and Julius treated Paul kindly, and allowed him to go to his friends to be cared for.

8.1.3.1 First Leg of the trip, Acts 27:1-6, pt. 3, v. 4

κάκειθεν ἀναχθέντες ὑπεπλεύσαμεν
τὴν Κύπρον διὰ τὸ τοὺς ἀνέμους εἶναι
ἐναντίους,

*Putting out to sea from there, we
sailed under the lee of Cyprus,
because the winds were against
us.*



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8.1.3. Voyage to Rome, Acts 27:1-28:13

8.1.3.1 First Leg of the trip, Acts 27:1-6, pt. 4, vv. 5-6

5 τὸ τε πέλαγος τὸ κατὰ τὴν Κιλικίαν καὶ Παμφυλίαν διαπλεύσαντες κατήλθομεν εἰς Μύρα τῆς Λυκίας. 6 Κάκεϊ εὐρῶν ὁ ἑκατοντάρχης πλοῖον Ἀλεξανδρινὸν πλέον εἰς τὴν Ἰταλίαν ἐνεβίβασεν ἡμᾶς εἰς αὐτό.

5 After we had sailed across the sea that is off Cilicia and Pamphylia, we came to Myra in Lycia. 6 There the centurion found an Alexandrian ship bound for Italy and put us on board.

8.1.3.2 Second Leg of the trip, Acts 27:7-12, pt. 1, vv. 7-8

7 ἐν ἱκαναῖς δὲ ἡμέραις βραδυπλοοῦντες καὶ μόλις γενόμενοι κατὰ τὴν Κνίδον, μὴ προσεώντος ἡμᾶς τοῦ ἀνέμου ὑπεπλεύσαμεν τὴν Κρήτην κατὰ Σαλμώνην, 8 μόλις τε παραλεγόμενοι αὐτὴν ἤλθομεν εἰς τόπον τινὰ καλούμενον Καλοῦς λιμένας ὧς ἐγγὺς πόλις ἦν Λασαία.

7 We sailed slowly for a number of days and arrived with difficulty off Cnidus, and as the wind was against us, we sailed under the lee of Crete off Salmone. 8 Sailing past it with difficulty, we came to a place called Fair Havens, near the city of Lasea.

8.1.3.2 Second Leg of the trip, Acts 27:7-12, pt. 2, v. 9

Ἰκανοῦ δὲ χρόνου διαγενομένου
καὶ ὄντος ἤδη ἐπισφαλοῦς τοῦ
πλοῦς διὰ τὸ καὶ τὴν νηστείαν ἤδη
παρληλυθέναι παρήνει ὁ Παῦλος

*Since much time had been lost
and sailing was now dangerous,
because even the Fast had already
gone by, Paul advised them,*

8.1.3.2 Second Leg of the trip, Acts 27:7-12, pt. 3, v. 10

λέγων αὐτοῖς· ἄνδρες, θεωρῶ ὅτι μετὰ ὑβρεως καὶ πολλῆς ζημίας οὐ μόνον τοῦ φορτίου καὶ τοῦ πλοίου ἀλλὰ καὶ τῶν ψυχῶν ἡμῶν μέλλειν ἔσεσθαι τὸν πλοῦν.

saying, "Sirs, I can see that the voyage will be with danger and much heavy loss, not only of the cargo and the ship, but also of our lives."



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8.1.3. Voyage to Rome, Acts 27:1-28:13

8.1.3.2 Second Leg of the trip, Acts 27:7-12, pt. 4, v. 11

ὁ δὲ ἑκατοντάρχης τῷ κυβερνήτῃ
καὶ τῷ ναυκλήρῳ μᾶλλον ἐπέειθετο
ἢ τοῖς ὑπὸ Παύλου λεγομένοις.

But the centurion paid more attention to the pilot and to the owner of the ship than to what Paul said.



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8.1.3. Voyage to Rome, Acts 27:1-28:13

8.1.3.2 Second Leg of the trip, Acts 27:7-12, pt. 5, v. 12

ἀνευθέτου δὲ τοῦ λιμένος ὑπάρχοντος πρὸς παραχειμασίαν οἱ πλείονες ἔθεντο βουλήν ἀναχθῆναι ἐκεῖθεν, εἴ πως δύναιντο κατανήσαντες εἰς Φοῖνικα παραχειμάσαι λιμένα τῆς Κρήτης βλέποντα κατὰ λίβα καὶ κατὰ χῶρον.

Since the harbor was not suitable for spending the winter, the majority was in favor of putting to sea from there, on the chance that somehow they could reach Phoenix, where they could spend the winter. It was a harbor of Crete, facing southwest and northwest.



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- **What can we learn from first two legs of the voyage to Rome?**

- ✓ 1. Traveling by ship in the first century leaves a lot to be desired.
- ✓ 2. Christian friends at Sidon took care of Paul in his journey.
- ✓ 3. Christian advice has impact when based on earned respect.
- ✓ 4. Foolish decisions will usually prove to be disastrous.
